Pastor Transition

THE PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE (PNC) began its work to find the next installed pastor back in late August with four members from Tomales Church (Amanda

Graves; Eric Knudsen; Liz Mitchell; & Kathryn LeMieux) and four members from Two Rock Valley Church (Lonnie Wernstrum; Jessica Briggs; Kathy Stroke; & Don White). Amanda Graves has subsequently resigned due to family obligations, however her contributions to the PNC were very valuable and will be missed. The first order of work was to complete the Ministry Information Form (MIF), and submit it to both sessions for approval and then onto Commission on Ministry (COM) for their approval. The MIF was approved by both sessions in mid-October and then approved by COM in early November. With this approval we were now set to review submitted Pastor Information Forms (PIF's) through the CLC system of the PCUSA. The PNC has been diligently meeting once a week during this entire process except for December due to Christmas. We have so far reviewed over 100 PIF's with some possible candidates coming through. We also have added the job posting to both church's websites as well as Presbytery's website. With God's guidance, we will continue our work until we find the right pastor for our two churches.

The PNC has requested that the Sessions reinstate the Temporary Pastor Nominating Committee (TPNC) to look for another temporary Pastor to continue after Pastor Brook leaves us at the end of June. The TPNC is made up of four members; Kathy Stroke and Brent Russell from Two Rock and Mary Spragens and Sharon Knudsen from Tomales. We will begin meeting soon and will be requesting applicants from the Presbytery of the Redwoods. Hopefully we will have several resumes to review and can choose a person who can continue all the good work that Pastor Brook has done.

Brook's Book Pick

Women Rowing North: Navigating Life's Currents and Flourishing as We Age By Mary Pipher

Life can pose so many challenges, particularly as we age. Going from middle to old age can present health challenges and unexpected loss. How do we navigate such changes? Mary Pipher's book does a good job at laying out the skills that can help. Filled with stories from her many decades as a psychologist, she imbues her book with wisdom and grace that has been honed through decades of walking alongside others on their journey from loss to resilience. The author of best-seller Reviving Ophelia in the mid-1990s, Pipher focuses on the very real experiences that older women face. Pipher reflects on how past despair can be a valuable springboard in a deepening cycle toward gratitude, illumination, awe, and wonder, even in the silver years of life.

Officer Training took place via zoom on March 7th, 2023. Session continues to work at updating policies (personnel & financial) as we look forward to welcoming a new permanent pastor.

No one has risen to the top as of yet, but they continue to search. Thank you to Amanda Graves, Eric Knudsen, Kathryn LeMieux and Liz Mitchell for serving on the Tomales PNC.

The Advent Season included the beautiful and inspirational joint candle light service held in the Two Rock Church. Participants from both churches read scripture and performed including the joint bell choir directed by Suzanne Lang. Two Rock provided refreshments after. Since Christmas Sunday fell on Christmas Day we held a joint worship in Tomales with the bell choir performing. The beautiful decorations done by our Deacons and the great acoustics in our sanctuary made for a moving and memorable service.

Our Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held on January 29 following worship and a brunch provided by the Deacons. Focus on David Burbank of Tomales with Kathy Murphy

DAVID BURBANK IS A LONGTIME AND FAITHFUL MEMBER OF TOMALES CHURCH, having been born on the Burbank Ranch just outside Tomales town. Kathy had a delicious lunch with him and found out a little bit about his family history and his connection to the church.

David: In 1854 my grandfather and his brother George decided to come out and ranch here. They came from Massachusetts, so they had to travel around the Cape Horn (which took about six months) but I'm sure that they went first class. They came into San Francisco and then they came up to Marin

County. They came with money to buy property, buy livestock, and hire people. Each brother got a ranch, and the ranches touch the backside, but you go in differently. You go into my grandfather, David's place off Fallon Road, and the other one, belonging to George, you come onto from Tomales Road. Stemple Creek ran through both ranches. Now our ranch is known as Stemple Creek Ranch.

My grandfather and his wife, along with George and his wife, needed a church, so they instigated the church building, and got people together to build it. It wasn't Presbyterian then.

Kathy: Oh, so it was more of a community church.

David: Well, there wasn't anything out there, except for the Catholic church.

People wanted a community place and their wives from the East Coast were used to more organization. They wanted a place to get married in and have the kids baptized in, so they got the building going with a lot of volunteers and a lot of PR. The community got behind them and I think they arranged for itinerant pastors. Two Rock Church was there already but, back in those buggy days, Two Rock was a long way away. They were very supportive though.

The church burned down just after it was built. They were piling up the trash from all the building in readiness for the church's dedication, and it caught alight and burned the church down, so they had to build another one. They went around with their hands out and everybody had to chip in. In those days the community valued a church more than they do today. Today it's the memory of the church that's valued.

Kathy: Tell me a little about your great uncle, Luther Burbank.

David: Back east, grandfather's father wanted their younger brother, Luther, to be a medical doctor and sent him off medical school but Luther liked plants. And so, when his father died, he quit school and came out to California. By then there was a train, and it only took nine days to get out here. He was closest to my grandfather, David, and he lived with them there on the ranch for two years, until his mother arrived and they bought property in Santa Rosa.

He was quite a bit younger than David and George, and he was famous for his "Burbank Potato". Luther was out in the garden, hoeing the potatoes, when he noticed a funny little seed nodule. He'd never seen a seed that grew out of a potato plant before. So, he watched it mature and he got two seeds out of it that were viable. He planted them and they became the Burbank Potato, a big russet potato. It was just chance, nothing that he did. He did lots of other things on purpose, (like the Shasta Daisy and the Lily of the Valley). He worked with grains, with wheat. And then, of course, he had the place in Sebastopol where he grew the big things, Oak trees and things like that. He got a lot of recognition for his work.

My grandfather was almost 70 when my father was born in 1899. He had remarried and my grandmother was a Coastal Miwok. Dad was born at the ranch, just like I was. A few years later my

grandfather bought a place in Petaluma, and they moved in there because my 5-year-old dad was ready for kindergarten, and the local schools didn't have kindergarten. His father drove him to school in the morning and home again for lunch. Of course, he used a horse and buggy in those days. And then finally, when my dad was about 13, he convinced his father that it was time to get a car because he was commuting out to Tomales in a horse and buggy, which was kind of a long commute. You know, at that time, getting a car was like getting a helicopter today. My grandfather had never driven anything else but a horse and buggy before, and they didn't have license training then. Well, they drove out to the house, and the new car was going towards the ditch and my grandfather just said, "Woah!" like he was still driving the horses. After that my father became the family chauffeur at age 13. He drove that Model T Ford all over the place.

My parents were very active in the church, held every position. My dad was inspiring. He wasn't just a farmer. He was on the board of directors of several different companies, and then he and two of his friends started the Bank of Marin. I'm the only one, generationally, who hasn't started a bank!

Kathy: Did you meet your wife, Marianne, through the church?

David: After my military service, I moved back onto the ranch. I was single in those days and if you're down working on the tractor, it's hard to meet people. A bunch of us decided we needed to have a group called Young Single Adults (YSA). The young pastor from the UCC church in Petaluma and his wife agreed to be the sponsors of it. We went out to different places and did different things. It was cool. Most of the people we met were teachers. That's where I met Marianne. That's where John (Mitchell) met Joanne.

Now, financially, just farming was not a good thing. The costs were so high and, depending on prices, the income could be very low. Even now, you could have a \$200 000 business and you get \$4 000 net income. I had a friend who worked for a friend - you know how that goes - and this friend was starting an Instructional Materials for Schools business and, and they wanted somebody to do the business side. He asked me if I was available and I told him, yes, I was, well, I was just out of graduate school. He had his headquarters in Santa Cruz and this friend of mine was in the East Bay, so we covered the whole area, and we did very well.

I bought into the business, so when I retired from that, we sold the business. Well, I was only 54 and so I thought, I'll just golf every day for the rest of my life! But my wife, Marianne, she was in education. She loved teaching. She was a school principal, and that kind of rubbed off on me. I thought, she's having such a good time. Why can't I join in?

So, at 55, I started teaching. I had to take a few more classes and then I taught special education. And I just loved the kids, loved the parents and it was very different. I started at the high school, and I worked my way up to get to the elementary school level. You get a lot more hugs at elementary school. I kept doing that until I was 72 and it was just fun. I liked doing it and I had free summers every year. We went on great vacations - tours and things like that, Australia and New Zealand, Europe several times. That was a good time because the kids were away in college, we had nothing to keep us at home, and we could afford it.

We have two children, Margaret, and Stuart. (David and Marianne first had a son who died young and is buried in Tomales Cemetery). After Margaret was born, we adopted Stuart who has adopted two children of his own. Margaret has three girls. The grandkids live all over the place now but when they're in town they all come to church with me.

Kathy: Did you always go to church?

David: Oh yes. I was born into that church in 1933. I've had a long time with it. I have a headstone in the cemetery, but so far it just has my birthdate on it! My grandfather and his brother lived into their 90s, I turn 90 in April, so I'm thinking I might be reaching the end here. But if I died tomorrow, I'd be ready. I've had a great life, a wonderful family, a lot of love.




